

This month we will celebrate 25 years of Paton's Premier Pars. The sold-out event promises to be a great afternoon with a great turnout from the players and staff from the season.




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A STRIP BACK IN TIME

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For this edition, we are going "off the pitch" for once as Jason Barber spoke to the club's commercial manager between 1986 and 1988: Karen Grega.

At a time when the club was going through very rapid progress on the park, it was agreed that similar development was needed off the park in order for the club to try and keep up with the additional support, and publicity, it was garnering through the results and promotions being targeted.

Karen was working in Edinburgh at the time and takes up the story as to how she ended up as the club's high profile, and extremely successful, Commercial Manager; "My mum was from Paisley, and my dad Slovakian, so I had some family ties and roots to Scotland already. Plenty of cousins over here too, so even though it was on the other side of the

world, it certainly wasn't a complete unknown.

"I moved across to work for a great friend and colleague, Nicky O'Reilly, who had a PR company in Edinburgh at the time; Capital PR. Nicky and her husband were looking for a partner to come in with an interest in football/ sport in general. They had a contract working with Skol and it was the lead up to the annual Skol Cup final at Hampden when Nicky's husband sadly passed away suddenly. She, understandably, had to deal with all of that and I stepped up before the final and helped get the company get that work over the line. It was the 1986 final between Celtic and Rangers in front of 75.000 fans, so an absolute dream come true to be involved in the PR for that occasion!

Not long after that, I met with Dunfermline Athletic's informally board and

spoke about where the club was heading. It had recently won the Second Division and was destined for successive promotion and the Premier League awaited. After a good start to the season, that was looking like a distinct possibility, so I compiled a report on the commercial department at the football, and the opportunities that were perhaps being missed!

I met with dear Jessie Arnott, who became a close friend for many years, and pulled together suggestions of where the club could make improvements. At that time, the commercial offices were like broom cupboards, with daylight getting into them and the shop was not doing some of the more obvious things; such as using window displays to appeal to passing supporters.

I wanted the staff to have nice offices and feel



important, make people like Jessie feel proud to be there. I pulled together my report and met with the club's board, who then offered me a job!

One of the key things I tried to bring in was organisation and the staff having some confidence in themselves. The media coverage at the time was huge, so again we had to use that to our benefit. "Crocodile Dunfermline" was one newspaper headline. given the popular film at the time. I also went out and met with all sorts of various organisations in the area: Fife Young Farmers, PR students who were studying at the local Lauder College for example. There was the odd television interview as well which brought in considerable publicity, although lan Archer at Scotsport did do the "what's a nice girl like you doing working in a place like this?" line!

One of my proudest moments came on the journey back from a midweek match.

the wonderful Bob Crampsey was on the radio and had seen some of the work taking place at Dunfermline. He gave some lovely and detailed coverage on the professional work that was being carried out by all the team behind the scenes at Dunfermline, hearing it from someone as knowledgable and kind as Bob really meant a lot to me. It was a validation of everything taking place.

Some of the work we carried out during my time at the club included the first Jock Stein suite which was installed in an area that was previously a void near the Paragon Club. It was the club's first executive lounge and brought in new revenue streams.

The Centenary Club had not long been launched so I also worked with people like Jim Harrison to make sure that got a lot of coverage. I created a sponsorship brochure, something the club had not done before, and other clubs were impressed with the levels of sponsorship we were

offering to local businesses and individuals. Jim Farry, who was head of the SFA at the time, said "you're ten, maybe twenty, years too early for some of these initiatives" I would constantly ask if the club could do something new, or unusual, even having two different sponsors on the strips for example. Because nobody had asked before, they were often stumped when I'd ask them if we could something out of the ordinary! After struggling to get a shirt sponsor, we ended up with Aluglaze and then Thomson's after themselves

Of course, the club doing so well on the pitch helped massively. We had Jim Leishman as the manager at the time, who was brilliant at going out to local businesses and being the face of the club. Players included John Watson and Norrie McCathie, who were both happy to attend events and put themselves forward for any PR events that we had. With those three involved, we didn't struggle to

get media coverage during my time at the club! Mel Rennie was chairman, who was an absolute gentleman and a huge supporter of the work that was going on too.

The club was obviously promoted to the Premier League and I left at the start of that season. Jock Brown approached me as he was setting up a new business based in Glasgow in player management/agency, and it was too good an opportunity to miss out on. After that, I returned to Australia and have been non stop ever since, working in a

variety of high profile sport and media positions

These days, I'm actively involved in three boards:

- Football Coaches Australia
- · Heartbeat of Football:

aiming to have zero heart related deaths in football. We do pop up testing for supporters attending matches and now have defibrillators at all grounds across the country.


Dunbar Rovers FC, helping to promote good coaching and teaching

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
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


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




GUESS THE PAR?

By far one of The Pars favourite modern players, Joe Cardle recently made his 500th appearance in senior football. Joe is currently plying his trade within the thrilling project at Kelty Hearts and is a big hit with the Kelty fans.

Born in Blackpool on 7th February 1987, Joe progressed through junior football and signed for Port Vale in

2003. He signed senior forms for the Burslem club in 2005 and spent three years as a Port Vale player, although he had a loan spell with Clyde in 2007. Staying on in Scotland, Joe spent season 2008/09 with Airdrie, but had a falling out with certain people at the club and opted for a pre-signing agreement with Dunfermline Athletic. He ioined The Pars at the start of season 2009/10.

Joe became a firm favourite with Pars fans and remained so until he was forced to leave by the Administrator in 2013. By this time Joe had started 95 games, come on as substitute in 43 more and scored 24 goals. He spent the rest of 2013 with Fife rivals Raith Rovers before starting season

2014/15 with Ross County. To everyone's delight Joe was re-signed by Allan Johnston and played a big part in the promotion winning team of 2015/16. For three seasons, Joe remained one of the most popular players and made a further 70 starts and 29 substitute appearances scoring 31 more goals. To general dismay, Johnston choose not to offer Joe a

new contract, so he was on the move again, this time back to England to join the rising new team at AFC Fylde on the outskirts of Blackpool.

His family had become settled in Dunfermline and it was not long before he became homesick. His new club were understanding and in 2019 he joined Partick Thistle, who he helped to promotion back to the Championship.

He was not offered a new contract, however and in 2021 he joined the exciting project at Kelty Hearts where he passed 500 appearances. 237 of those appearances were with The Pars, the most recent addition to The Pars 200



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

He remained, mainly as a reserve, until 1964, when Doug Baillie started his he moved across Glasgow to join Third Lanark. The demise of the Hi-Hi's led to another move and in 1965 he joined Falkirk. At Brockville,

he was the key figure in The Bairns defence and in a four year spell he played well over 100 games.

In 1969, George Farm was looking for cover for Roy Barry and signed Doug for The Pars. With Roy's move to Coventry, Doug became the regular centre half and Doug Baillie played in all six of Dunfermline's Inter Cities Fairs Cup matches in season 1969-70. He made 26 starts and five as a substitute for Dunfermline Athletic before hanging up his boots.

After retiring as a player, Baillie became a football journalist, working for The Sunday Post. He was the chief football writer there for 32 years covering World Cups in Argentina and France and becoming President of the Scottish Football Writers' Association in 1990 before retiring in 2001.


An example of Doug's humour is recorded in the book Black and White Magic where he contributed to the background of what was termed on October 1969 as the 'Battle of Bordeaux'.

Scott Wilson appeared in the Champions League for former club Glasgow Rangers before joining The Pars in 2002. He is next up in our 200 club.

Scott Peter Wilson was born in Edinburgh on the 19th of March 1977.

The centre back began his career with Rangers under Walter Smith, making his debut at Ibrox against Ajax in the Champions League on in October 96 alongside future par Greg Shields.

Wilson predominately a squad player for the Govan side in their league titles wins of 99 and 2000. "Dinger," as he was known by the Ibrox support, also cameoed in Dick Advocaat's 99 Scottish League winning side.

Aged 25 and seeking to be a starter, Wilson ventured closer to home, and East End Park with his former teammate Barry Nicholson awaited him. Unfortunately, his debut was a 6-0 defeat in Fife to his former employers.

While a composed defender on the ball, which is why Jimmy Calderwood wanted Wilson in the first place, he was strong in the tackle and uncompromising to his opponents as shown by the fact he was booked 13 times in 39 appearances in his debut season.

Sadly, Wilson missed out on the 2004 Scottish Cup final because of appendicitis, but Scott did score the goal that knocked holders Hearts out of the 06-07 Scottish Cup. However, Pars were undone in the final by Celtic through a late Perrier-Doumbé goal, a year after being beaten by the same opposition in the 06 League Cup final with Scott starting both games.

The only silver lining that to be taken from those Scottish Cup finals defeats was entry into the UEFA Cup qualifiers. As a result: Wilson, alongside Darren

Young, Scott Thomson and Shields are the only players to feature in both UEFA Cup outings for DAFC.

Wilson was appointed captain by Stephen Kenny in late 07, and three weeks later, he led the team out in the Challenge Cup final against St Johnstone, scoring a consolation.


Wilson spent his best years with Dunfermline and left after his contract finished in June 09 to round off his career with North Queensland Fury. Scott joined up with lan Ferguson, who, while club captain, moved to Australia from East End Park seven vears previous.

13th March 1960 **Dunfermline appointed Jock** Stein as their manager. Celtic had appointed Stein to coach their reserve team after he retired as a player. Jock had not applied for the vacant post at Dunfermline but was invited to a meeting by the **Dunfermline directors.**

On his subseauent appointment his words to the assembled newsmen were: "The team is in a precarious

Two blunders which really swung the game came early in the second half. Five minutes in Alec Smith went on a mazy run. Weaving his way through the Celtic defence he saw Harry Melrose standing completely unmarked. MELROSE first timed his team mate's pass past Haffey. 2-1

Two minutes later MELROSE completed almost an identical manoeuvre to put the Pars 3-1 up. From a melee involving Dickson and Jim Kerray, the ball went out to the wing. McKay seemed to have forgotten that the former Rangers play existed and although Haffev saved the first effort Harry made no mistake when the ball rebounded to him.

Dunfermline never looked back although a defensive mistake by Stevenson allowed Conway to split the Pars defence and score a second with half an hour still to play. Connachan stopped Conway's shot but Alec BYRNE smashed home the loose ball 3-2

> The heroic Dunfermline defence, ably generalled by Stevenson, held out. They succeeded in making the Celtic attack - which earlier seemed capable of doing great things - look pretty mediocre. Pars supporters found it hard to comprehend the transformation that was started by Jock Stein and came to expect their team to be near the top of the league and in European competition. Dunfermline will be eternally grateful for his contribution.

> While undoubtedly a legend in his own lifetime. Jock Stein's affection for Dunfermline remained a deep and powerful one. He famously wrestled the Scottish Cup with George Farm as the Champions took on the Cup winners in April 1968 and his happy return for the Centenary Match in 1985 at East End Park.
